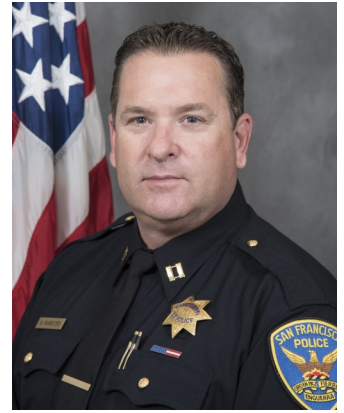
In this issue, you will find information on events that are happening in our district and around the city. This issue also contains the current crime statistics for robbery, burglary and auto burglary.

SFPD Alert Community of Arrest Warrant Scam 19-052

Tuesday, May 07, 2019

San Francisco Police have received information that scammers are contacting residents claiming they have outstanding warrants or have committed crimes such as prostitution and must pay a fine. These scammers sometimes use technology known as "caller ID spoofing" to display the SFPD non-emergency phone number or other official looking phone numbers on the victim's caller ID.

San Francisco Police urge all members of the community to be suspicious of strangers calling for money to pay outstanding warrants or fines as this is not the correct procedure. Anyone who receives such a call should hang up immediately. Do not engage the caller in conversation and never give out personal information.

Anyone who has received such a call and provided either personal identification information (such Social Security or driver's license numbers) or given payment by any means, should file a police report in the jurisdiction of their residence.

'One Ring' Phone Scam

For illegal robocallers, the goal isn't always getting you to answer. Sometimes, it's getting you to call back.

Every so often, your phone may ring once and then stop. If that happens to you, and you do not recognize the number, do not return the call. You may be the target of a "one-ring" phone scam.

One-ring calls may appear to be from phone numbers somewhere in the United States, including three initial digits that resemble U.S. area codes. But savvy scammers often use international numbers from regions that also begin with three-digit codes – for example, "649" goes to the Turks and Caicos and "809" goes to the Dominican Republic. Such scammers may often use [spoofing](#) techniques, as well, to further mask the number in your caller ID display.

If you call any such number, you risk being connected to a phone number outside the U.S. As a result, you may wind up being charged a fee for connecting, along with significant per-minute fees for as long as they can keep you on the phone. These charges may show up on your bill as premium services.

Variations of this scam rely on phony voice-mail messages urging you to call a number with an unfamiliar area code to "collect a prize" or to notify you about a "sick" relative.

How to avoid this scam

- Don't answer or return any calls from numbers you don't recognize.
- Before calling unfamiliar numbers, check to see if the area code is international.
- If you do not make international calls, ask your phone company to block outgoing international calls on your line.
- Always be cautious, even if a number appears authentic.

Filing a complaint

If you are billed for a call you made as a result of this scam, first try to resolve the matter with your phone company. If you are unable to resolve it directly, you can file a complaint with the FCC at no cost. You have multiple options for filing a complaint with the FCC:

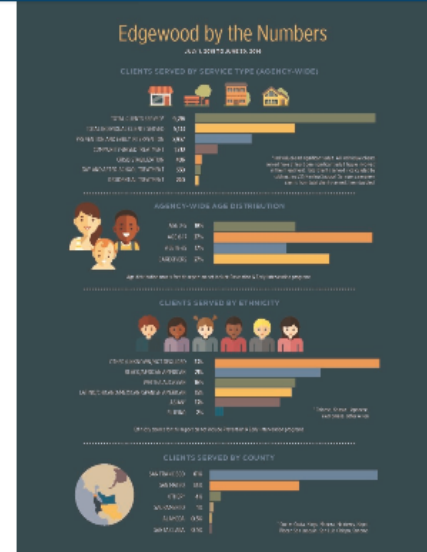

Protect Your Vehicle Against Catalytic Converter Theft



Thieves are looking for fuel-powered vehicles manufactured after 1974 that have catalytic converters. Thieves often target taller vehicles (such as pickup trucks or SUVs) because they can easily fit under the vehicle to access the catalytic converter. Also targeted are 2000's model Toyota's and Hondas. The location of your car may also be a factor like regularly parking in one area for a long period of time. When possible, park in well-lit areas and close to building entrances. If you have a garage at your house, park your vehicle inside and keep the garage door close.

Have the catalytic converter welded to your car's frame, which may make it harder to steal.

Consider engraving your vehicle identification number (VIN) on the catalytic converter — this may help alert a scrap dealer that it was stolen and make it easier to identify the owner.

Calibrate your car's alarm to set off when it detects vibration.

In these incidents, suspects would break into the building or construction sites and steal numerous high end construction equipment. Currently, if your home is under construction and no one is at that location after work hours, please call Taraval Station at 415-759-3100 and provide your name and the address of the construction site and phone number. We can have our officers conduct passing calls.

Burglary Awareness & Prevention Tips for Construction Sites



Securing & Preventing

1. Secure all equipment and vehicles at all times.
2. Take effort to reduce the visibility of tools and equipment secured in vehicles or on job sites.
3. Make use of adequate lighting in conjunction with open chain-link fencing on the perimeter to allow for high visibility to the job site.
4. Strongly consider the use of security systems such as alarms and video surveillance. Ensure signage for such is clearly visible.

Precautionary Measures

1. Photograph all tools. Ensure photographs clearly show the associated serial number and/or distinctive markings.
2. Ensure job site keys are marked "Do Not Duplicate" and are controlled at all times.
3. Attempt to park employee vehicles within visual range of the job site.

Should a Burglary Occur

Immediately contact 911. Be prepared to provide the following information:

- a) Time of incident.
- b) Video (if available).
- c) Items taken (include make, model, description, location taken from, value, photos and serial numbers).
- d) Insurance information.
- e) Owner's information.

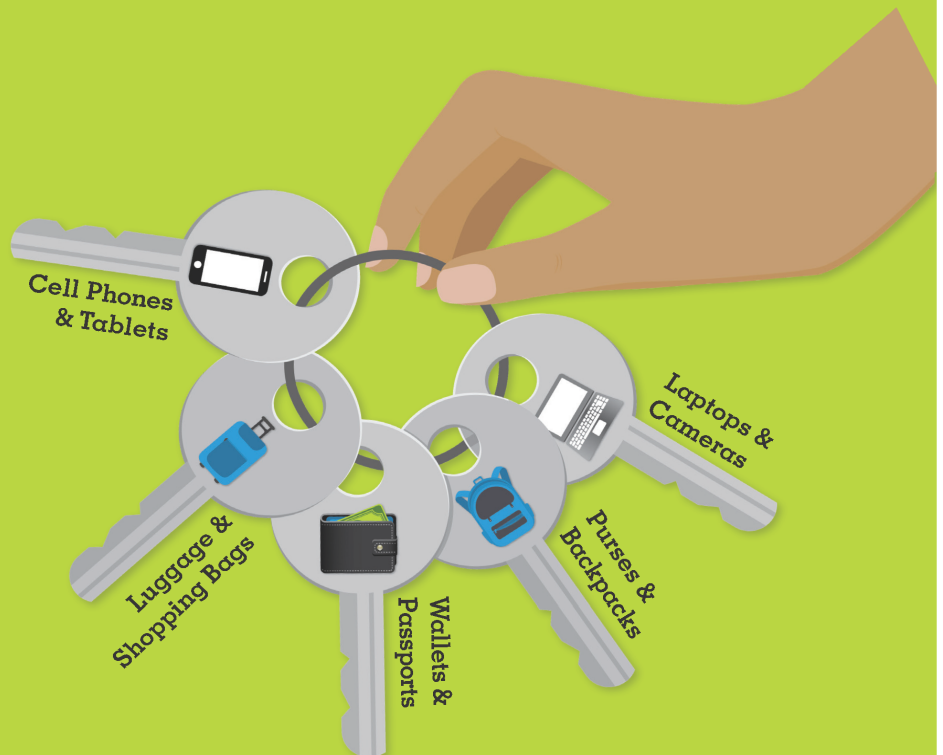

Warrant Arrest – Arrested

Officers were on patrol in the area when they observed a vehicle that had its engine on while the windows were covered with a blanket. A computer check on the vehicle revealed that the registration had been expired since December 2018. The officers made contact with the two occupants who were inside the vehicle. Further investigation revealed that one of the occupants had two arrest warrants and he was arrested.

Officers responded to a report of a ride sharing passenger who was involved in a fight. Responding officers arrived at the location and located the victim, who was bleeding while on the ground. The witness, the driver, reported that he had arrived to pick up a passenger and observed the victim and suspect speaking to each other. The suspect was about to enter the vehicle when the victim said something to the suspect and the suspect responded angrily and chased after the victim. The suspect then punched the victim on the face and slammed his head on to the ground before fleeing the area.

Driving While under the Influence – Arrested

Officers responded to a report of a drunk driver being detained by a citizen. Responding officers arrived at the location and made contact with the witness who reported that he had received information that a vehicle was blocking a driveway. When he arrived at the location, the witness observed the suspect unsuccessfully attempting to start his vehicle multiple times despite the vehicle's gear was placed in reverse. The suspect failed a field sobriety test and after further investigation, he was arrested.

Battery

The victim came to Taraval Station to report an incident of battery. The victim stated that he had a party at his house when the suspect, a friend of a friend, grabbed him by his neck. Other guests pulled the suspect away from the victim and the suspect left the area afterwards.

The witness, a nursery school worker, reported that one of the class room doors had been unlocked despite the teachers regularly locking each door at night. Officers responded to a report of a suspect who was releasing the air out of the victim's vehicle's tire. Responding officers made contact with the victim, who had recorded the incident. The suspect was detained but refused to provide his name to the officers and attempted to leave the scene. The suspect was transported to Taraval Station and after further investigation, the **suspect was cited**.

The first party, a security officer, responded to a report that a person, the second party, had been inside the bathroom for a long time and went to investigate. The first party stated that the second party was told to leave and the second party kicked the first party's foot. The second party stated that the first party had yelled at her and was escorting her out when she accidentally stepped on the first party's foot and that the first party punched her afterwards. Both parties requested that the incident be documented.

The officers pursued the suspect and caught up to him as he was attempting to destroy a glass pipe, which is something commonly used to smoke methamphetamine. After further investigation, **the bicyclist was cited.**

Officers responded to a report of a suspect who had shoplifted from a store. Responding officers arrived at the store and an immediate search for the suspect was unsuccessful. A computer check on the suspect also revealed a warrant for his arrest. **The suspect was arrested**

Beware of Scams

Fake Check Scams

Consumers paid with phony checks for work or for items they're trying to sell, instructed to wire money back to buyer

Prizes/Sweepstakes/Free Gifts

Requests for payment to claim fictitious prizes, lottery winnings, or gifts

Recovery/Refund Companies

Scammers contact victims and claim the consumer owes money on a fictitious debt or to help recover money lost in a previous scam

Advance Fee Loans, Credit Arrangers

False promises of business or personal loans, even if credit is bad, for a fee upfront

Phishing/Spoofing

Emails pretending to be from a well-known source ask consumers to enter or confirm personal information

Computers: Equipment and Software

Scammers claim to offer "technical support" for computer problems and charge a fee to fix a nonexistent problem

Scholarships/Grants

For a fee, a "search company" offers to conduct customized search for scholarships or grants for students. Scammers take money and run or provide a worthless list

Friendship & Sweetheart Swindles

Con artist nurtures an online relationship, builds trust, and convinces victim to send money

Charitable Solicitations

Scammers contact victims claiming to represent non-existent charities (or real charities they don't actually work for) and ask for donations.



Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.

Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users:

Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.

Foot Patrols:

Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.

Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings:

Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving. These meeting will be on the third Tuesday of each month.

Email Updates:

Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.

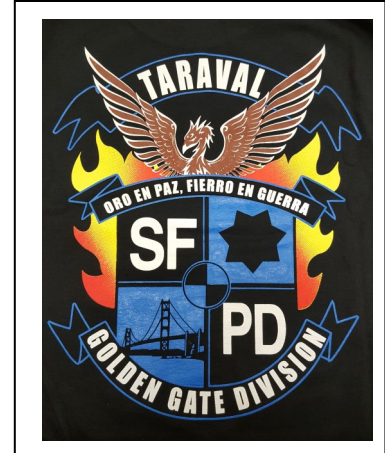
