Each month Taraval Police Station features a citizen who represents the unique flavors of the Taraval Police District. This month, we interviewed William Barnickel a resident of the Sunset District.



William Barnickel

1- President for the Outer Sunset Merchants Professional Association representing merchants from 19th Ave-27th Ave. We are the association that brought the SF Police Credit Union from 20th & Noreiga to its present location.

We are the first association that bought 10 speed bikes for the police (Taraval Station) in the 80's. We are the only association that for the past 10 yrs in conjunction with the SFPD that delivers toys to families in need.

2- Appointed by the Board of Supervisors in Jan 2016 as Commissioner Veterans Affairs for the City and County of San Francisco. Have done yearly job fairs for the veterans at City College and most importantly assisting our veterans on their benefits

This year Nov 8th had a press conference at City Hall in collaboration with the Institute on Aging (lead agency) with the Department of Justice, Attorney General's Office, Dept of Insurance, and Social Services Agencies in San Francisco to pass into law to prosecute individuals who are scamming and pouching our Elder Vets in care homes and assisted living facilities.





Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.







Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- <u>Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users</u>: Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- <u>Foot Patrols</u>: Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.
- <u>Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings</u>: Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- <u>Email Updates</u>: Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.





Definition of Crimes

<u>Robbery</u> – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

<u>Assault</u> – An assault is an unlawful attempt, couple with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery – (Misdemeanor Battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony Battery) is the use of force or violence up the person of another that causes serious bodily injuries.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm at a person and battery is when that arm makes contact with the person.

<u>Aggravated Assault</u>- Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

<u>Burglary</u> – The intent to enter a property to commit a grand theft, petty, theft or any felony.

<u>**Grand Theft**</u> – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken that exceeds \$950.

<u>Petty Theft</u> – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Traffic Violations

<u>22450(a)</u> CVC The driver of any vehicle approaching a stop sign at the entrance to, or within, an intersection **shall stop at a limit line**, if marked, otherwise before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection.

<u>21450(a)</u> CVC The driver of any vehicle approaching a **stop sign** at the entrance to, or within, an intersection shall **stop** at a limit line, if marked, otherwise before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection.

<u>22350 CVC</u> No person shall drive a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than is reasonable or prudent having due regard for weather, visibility, the **traffic** on, and the surface and width of, the highway, and in no event at a speed which endangers the safety of persons or property.

<u>21950(a)</u> CVC The driver of a vehicle shall **yield** the right-of-way to a **pedestrian** crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, except as otherwise provided in this chapter.

<u>21801(a)</u> CVC The driver of a vehicle intending to turn to the left or to complete a U-turn upon a highway, or to turn left into public or private property, or an alley, shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles approaching from the opposite direction which are close enough to constitute a hazard at any time during the turning movement, and shall continue to yield the right-of-way to the approaching vehicles until the left turn or U-turn can be made with reasonable safety.

The suspect then left the area.

Officers responded to Safeway regarding an assault. Responding officers arrived and located a subject matching the description of the suspect, who was later confirmed by the victim as being the suspect. The victim, a store employee, stated that the suspect had



walked into the store and started placing multiple items of merchandise into a basket before immediately walking out of the store without paying at the registers. The victim attempted to detain the suspect by grabbing the basket but the suspect punched the victim in the face. The suspect then dropped the basket and exited the store while yelling and screaming. A search of the subject located a six inch knife in a sheath which was concealed under the suspect's shirt along with a dagger and a replica hand gun. The suspect was arrested.

Officers responded to a report of a battery. The victim reported that he was walking in the parking lot towards his vehicle when he was bumped on the back of his leg by the suspect's vehicle, which was backing up. The victim stated that he did not believed he was injured but wanted to alert the suspect that he had been hit by the vehicle. However, the suspect was not interested in exchanging information. The victim attempted to prevent the suspect from leaving by standing in the way but suspect then got out of the vehicle, said "excuse me" and pushed the suspect aside before driving away.








Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations on January 4th, 8th, 10th and 30th with a focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety. Over the past three years, the department has identified areas where significant numbers of pedestrian and bicycle-related collisions have occurred and responded by deploying additional officers to those areas in an effort to prevent deaths and injuries. Special attention will be given to Focus on the Five violations: speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for stop signs and red lights, failing to yield to pedestrians in cross walks, as well as any other dangerous violation.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use these nonmotorized means of transportation. In 2016, California witnessed 867 pedestrians and 147 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 28 percent of all traffic fatalities.

All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked or unmarked crosswalks at corners. All motorists are reminded to be mindful of others who share the road.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.



San Francisco Tips

Dreas in layers - San Francisco has evental microclimates that can change the temperature by 10 degrees from block to block.

To assume cyclists' safety, check your surrocadings before opening car doors, making right turns and crossing the street. If you will be biking please note that it is unlawful for bikes to travel on the sidewarks in San Francisca.

Take a reusable bag when you go shopping to avoid a .10¢ per bag fee.

A Muni Vialtar Pasa can be purchosed for 1, 3, or 7 conservive days of unimited rides on Muni, Muni Metro, historic streetcars and cable cars. They can be purchased at most Walgmens in the day, the San Francisco Visitor Information Center at 900 Market Street and the cable car kinets.

Every Tuesday at soon San Francisco tests the Outdoor Warning System flut units a 15 second alect tone. If you hear the sizens at any other time go indoors immediately.

When perking on one of San Francisco's famous hills make sure to ourb your wheels. Turn the fires soward the street whon facing uphiliand toward the ourb when facing downhill to use the ourb as a black.

Do not pass stopped cable cars or straetcors.

Se alert, particularly in crowded situations. Staged distractions are a favorite play of pickpackets.

*** Press Release *** New Year's Eve Emergency Alerts in San Francisco

San Francisco, CA – The San Francisco Department of Emergency Management (SFDEM) encourages people celebrating New Year's Eve in San Francisco to text the phrase NYESF17 to 888-777 to receive emergency text message alerts related to New Year's Eve events in San Francisco. New Year's Eve celebrants may also visit <u>www.sfdem.org/NYESF</u>.

SFDEM has setup a special New Year's Eve registration code for the AlertSF emergency text system. Thousands of people come into the City to celebrate New Year's Eve. These visitors may not be registered for AlertSF or have any interest in receiving regular alerts. This will allow visitors to receive emergency alerts for New Year's Eve only.

AlertSF is a text-based notification system for San Francisco's residents and visitors. AlertSF will send alerts regarding emergencies disrupting vehicular/pedestrian traffic, watches and warnings for tsunamis, flooding, and Citywide post-disaster information to your registered wireless devices.

San Francisco public safety agencies are working with our state and federal partners to help keep New Year's Eve celebrations safe for all people. The City will have additional resources available on New Year's Eve. This means there will be more police officers, fire fighters, ambulances, deputies, and dispatchers available to respond. San Francisco's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) will be active to support first responders, coordinate city resources, and provide public information.

San Francisco residents, visitors, and businesses can help by remaining vigilant while enjoying New Year's Eve festivities. These simple tips will help you stay safe:

- If you see something, say something. Call 9-1-1 or talk to a police officer if you see something suspicious.
- Have a plan. It is easy to lose track of people during large events. It is even more difficult
 when there is an emergency. Designate a meet up spot if you get separated from your group.
- · Be aware of your surroundings and take note of emergency exits.
- · Have a designated driver or alternative transportation plan if you plan on drinking alcohol.
- All fireworks including "Safe and Sane" are dangerous and illegal in San Francisco. We
 encourage everyone to choose the safety and observe a public fireworks shows.
- If you have a noise complaint, call the police non-emergency line at (415) 553-0123.


