Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.



Definition of Crimes

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

<u>Assault</u> — An assault is an unlawful attempt, couple with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

<u>Battery</u> – (Misdemeanor Battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(**Felony Battery**) is the use of force or violence up the person of another that causes serious bodily injuries.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm at a person and battery is when that arm makes contact with the person.

Aggravated Assault- Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

<u>Burglary</u> – The intent to enter a property to commit a grand theft, petty, theft or any felony.

<u>Grand Theft</u> — Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken that exceeds \$950.

<u>Petty Theft</u> – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Traffic Violations

22450(a) CVC The driver of any vehicle approaching a stop sign at the entrance to, or within, an intersection **shall stop** at a **limit line**, if marked, otherwise before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection.

21450(a) CVC The driver of any vehicle approaching a **stop sign** at the entrance to, or within, an intersection shall **stop** at a limit line, if marked, otherwise before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection.

22350 CVC No person shall drive a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than is reasonable or prudent having due regard for weather, visibility, the **traffic** on, and the surface and width of, the highway, and in no event at a speed which endangers the safety of persons or property.

21950(a) CVC The driver of a vehicle shall **yield** the right-of-way to a **pedestrian** crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, except as otherwise provided in this chapter.

21801(a) CVC The driver of a vehicle intending to turn to the left or to complete a U-turn upon a highway, or to turn left into public or private property, or an alley, shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles approaching from the opposite direction which are close enough to constitute a hazard at any time during the turning movement, and shall continue to yield the right-of-way to the approaching vehicles until the left turn or U-turn can be made with reasonable safety.

Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- <u>Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users</u>: Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- <u>Foot Patrols</u>: Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- <u>Email Updates</u>: Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.


March 2018 - Week 3&4

Notable Arrests / Incidents of Note

On 3-23-18 at apx 0323 hours, Officers Leyva #2437 and Tindall #2030, responded to Stonestown Galleria regarding a burglary. Security Employee reported seeing 3 suspects rolling a safe on a dolly through a corridor towards the exit doors. Suspect descriptions were given to responding officers as well as the suspect vehicle, described as a white Toyota sedan last seen driving away E/B Winston towards 19th Ave. Officers Wong #2330 and Lee #2354 located the vehicle at Winston and Stonecrest Drive. A felony traffic stop was conducted without incident and 3 suspects were taken into custody. Cold shows were conducted positive and evidence linked to the burglary of See's Candies was located inside suspect vehicle. All stolen property was recovered, 3 suspects was booked for burglary and 1 suspect was already on active Federal Felony Probation for burglary. SFPD Burglary Unit will be handling this case.

On 3-25-18 at apx 1411 hours, 3I16B, Officers Leiva #1682 and Colclough #2411, responded to 10 Chester Ave (Church) on a report of a stabbing. Upon officer's arrival, they were met by the witness who advised them that a suspect had just stabbed his wife in the kitchen area of the church. Officers were pointed in the direction of the kitchen and responded to that area. Upon arrival in the kitchen, officers were confronted by a suspect holding a large hunting knife sitting on the floor and a female victim lying face down. The suspect stood up and pointed the knife in the direction of the officers from apx 15' away. Officers showed great restraint and ordered the suspect several times to drop the knife. The suspect finally dropped the knife at which time officers moved in to make the arrest. The suspect, later identified as victim's husband was taken into custody and transported to SFGH for apparent self-inflicted stab wounds. Victim was also transported to SFGH where she died of her stab wounds. SFPD Homicide Unit will be handling this case.

AlertSF is a text-based notification system for San Francisco's residents and visitors. AlertSF will send alerts regarding emergencies disrupting vehicular/pedestrian traffic, watches and warnings for tsunamis, flooding, and Citywide post-disaster information to your registered wireless devices and email accounts. Registrants can also sign up to receive English-language automated information feeds and/or alerts targeted to specific areas of the City.

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

- 1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
- 2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
- 3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.


