Dear residents and community members,

On Monday, April 9, 2019, the department announced that 10 of 30 identified residential burglars were arrested in connection with 60 residential burglaries in the Taraval, Ingleside and Bayview Districts. The serial crew has stolen close to \$3,000,000 in currency, jewelry, passports and guns. I would like to thank the Burglary Detail and the SIT teams for their continued hard work and the results are dramatic.

In comparison to March, the April trend for residential burglaries is significantly down. We have not had the same issue with daytime hot prowls, but still have late night garage burglaries in the district. As a department, we recommend that you lock your garage doors at night and request SF SAFE to evaluate your residence.

Please join us this Saturday, April 21, 2018 from 10:00 AM to 12:00 PM as Taraval Station will be hosting "Coffee with a COP" at Henry's House of Coffee, 1618 Noriega Street.

Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.







Definition of Crimes

- <u>**Robbery**</u> Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.
- <u>Assault</u> An assault is an unlawful attempt, couple with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person

violent injury on another person.

TARAVAL STATION

<u>Battery</u> – (Misdemeanor Battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another. (Felony Battery) is the use of force or violence up the person of another that causes serious bodily injuries.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm at a person and battery is when that arm makes

contact with the person.

Aggravated Assault - Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other

than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

<u>Burglary</u> – The intent to enter a property to commit a grand theft, petty, theft or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or

property taken that exceeds \$950.

<u>**Petty Theft**</u> – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Traffic Violations

<u>22450(a) CVC</u> The driver of any vehicle approaching a stop sign at the entrance to, or within, an intersection **shall stop at a limit line**, if marked, otherwise before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection.

<u>21450(a)</u> CVC The driver of any vehicle approaching a **stop sign** at the entrance to, or within, an intersection shall **stop** at a limit line, if marked, otherwise before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection.

<u>22350 CVC</u> No person shall drive a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than is reasonable or prudent having due regard for weather, visibility, the **traffic** on, and the surface and width of, the highway, and in no event at a speed which endangers the safety of persons or property.

<u>**21950(a)**</u> CVC The driver of a vehicle shall **yield** the right-of-way to a **pedestrian** crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, except as otherwise provided in this chapter.

<u>21801(a)</u> CVC The driver of a vehicle intending to turn to the left or to complete a U-turn upon a highway, or to turn left into public or private property, or an alley, shall yield the right







Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users:

Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.

Foot Patrols:

Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.

Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings:

Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.

Email Updates:

Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.





Notable Arrests / Incidents of Note

TARAVAL STATION

On 3-30-18 at apx 0957 hours, Officers Castro and Owens responded to 1501 Taraval Street (Wen's 123 Cleaners) regarding a verbal argument. Upon arrival, the suspect was gone. The suspect was described as a WM in his 30's wearing a black jacket and camouflage pants. The witness encountered the suspect in an area of the laundromat that is off limits to the public. As the witness was being interviewed, Officer Owens was flagged down by another witness reporting a suspicious vehicle parked in their driveway. The owner of the suspicious vehicle walked away from it and was described as a WM wearing a black jacket and camouflage pants. Officers searched the area for the suspect and found him hiding between some houses on 24th Ave between Taraval and Ulloa Streets. The suspect, had multiple warrants for his arrest out of San Mateo County and was also a convicted felon. Officers responded back to the suspect's vehicle and found it to have no license plates. A tow inventory of the vehicle found over 1500 live rounds of ammunition for various weapons. TNT Officers took over the case and found the suspect to be on probation with a search condition. TNT searched suspect's residence and found a certificate belonging to a retired law enforcement officer. Numerous rifle cases were seized as well as a holster. The owner of the certificate was contacted by TNT who advised them he had been burglarized a couple weeks ago and was missing several rifle cases and some misc. paperwork. No guns were stolen. The suspect was booked on above charges and remains in custody.

On 4-1-18 at apx 0030 hours, the victim was heard honking outside of her residence. She went outside and saw her ex-husband sitting behind the wheel of a white Pontiac Grand Am. The victim said she had not spoken to the suspect in 3 years because of all the documented violence against her from him. She was concerned how he found her and wanted to capture his license plate on her cell phone for the police. The suspect drove away in the Pontiac. At 1441 hours, the victim exited her home and saw the suspect parked in her driveway in the same Pontiac. The victim turned around to go back into her home but not before the suspect, who was seated in the driver's seat with the window up, tapped on his driver's window with a black semi auto handgun. The victim was apx 10' away from the vehicle as she saw the gun in his left hand and heard him say to her, "I'M GOING TO KILL YOU." The victim got back into her house and called police as the suspect drove away. Officers Santiago and Leiva responded. The victim showed the officers the picture of suspect's license plate and provided a telephone # for him. Officer Santiago contacted the suspect and asked to meet with him. The suspect said he lived at an address on Middlepoint. Officer Santiago requested a Bayview unit to check the area for the Pontiac and was advised by dispatch that the address did not exist. Officer Santiago ran the suspect driver's license which came back to an address of another address on Middlepoint. Bayview units were updated for possible suspect and vehicle location. Bayview Officers Biagini and Officer Filipi responded to Middlepoint and located the suspect and the Pontiac. The suspect was taken into custody without incident and his vehicle was towed with a hold for SVU.



AlertSF

AlertSF is a text-based notification system for San Francisco's residents and visitors. AlertSF will send alerts regarding emergencies disrupting vehicular/pedestrian traffic, watches and warnings for tsunamis, flooding, and Citywide post-disaster information to your registered wireless devices and email accounts. Registrants can also sign up to receive English-language automated information feeds and/or alerts targeted to specific areas

(ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

TARAVAL STATION

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

<u>After clearing a basic background check</u> you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

- 1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
- 2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
- 3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.


