We are continuing to educate the community about "Park Smart" and encouraging everyone to contact SFSafe to learn more on how to make your home more resistant to burglaries. Keep reading further to see a map on all the incident where robbery, burglary and theft from vehicle occurred. As a reminder the map accurately reflects the information available at the time of preparation. Numbers may or may not change as more information becomes available.

Traffic Reminder: Taraval Station has been getting some complaints from many different schools in our district regarding traffic safety. When dropping off or picking up your children from schools please be aware of your surroundings. We want to remind all parents to obey all traffic laws and not to double park, make illegal U-Turns, or block the streets. Please be mindful of the crossing guards as they are they to assist you. Please allow yourself more time for drop off and pick and use the designated area provided by your school. This will help keep our children safe with coming and going to school. Officers will be in the area to enforce all traffic laws.

Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.



Definition of Crimes

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

<u>Assault</u> – An assault is an unlawful attempt, couple with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

<u>Battery</u> – (Misdemeanor Battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another. (Felony Battery) is the use of force or violence up the person of another that causes serious bodily injuries.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm at a person and battery is when that arm makes contact with the person.

<u>Aggravated Assault</u>- Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent to enter a property to commit a grand theft, petty, theft or any felony.

<u>Grand Theft</u> – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken that exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Traffic Violations

22450(a) CVC The driver of any vehicle approaching a stop sign at the entrance to, or within, an intersection **shall stop at a limit line**, if marked, otherwise before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection.

21450(a) CVC The driver of any vehicle approaching a **stop sign** at the entrance to, or within, an intersection shall **stop** at a limit line, if marked, otherwise before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection.

22350 CVC No person shall drive a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than is reasonable or prudent having due regard for weather, visibility, the **traffic** on, and the surface and width of, the highway, and in no event at a speed which endangers the safety of persons or property.

21950(a) CVC The driver of a vehicle shall **yield** the right-of-way to a **pedestrian** crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection,

Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users:

Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.

Foot Patrols:

Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.

Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings:

Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving. These meeting will be on the third Tuesday of each month.

Email Updates:

Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.







Notable Arrests / Incidents of Note

On February 27th, 2018, a juvenile victim (15 years old) was severely assaulted in a planned attack outside Stonestown Mall by 6 suspects. During the assault the suspects used bodily force as well as, "brass knuckles." The victim received 3 suture staples and suffered a concussion as a result of the attack. Taraval SIT Sgt Jefferson has continued the investigation which has led to another identification and arrest, making this 4 of 6 suspects arrested to date. On April 19th Sgt Jefferson along with other members of Taraval SIT and TNT, served a search warrant in the Bayview District. The scope of the search was for brass knuckles used in the assault, clothing worn by the suspect and indicia. The service led to the seizure of the brass knuckles, clothing and indicia. Sgt Jefferson also arrested the juvenile suspect and booked him into custody at JJC.

On 4-26-18 at 1712 hours, Officers Hoang and Officer Sayasane responded to 2400 block of 16th Ave regarding a stolen vehicle. The victim advised officers that his vehicle had just been stolen by an unknown suspect. The suspect drove away N/B on 16th Ave from Taraval towards Santiago St. The officers broadcast the license plate, make and model over the air to responding units. Officers Colclough and Officer Gonzalez notified dispatch that they had the vehicle and the suspect at 20th and Vicente. Officers advised dispatch that the vehicle took off on them at a high rate of speed N/B 20th Ave. The officers did not pursue as they were on foot when they encountered the suspect and vehicle. Seconds later, the suspect and vehicle were involved in a multi vehicle collision at 20th and Quintara St. 4 victims and suspect were transported to SFGH where they were treated and released. The suspect was booked on charges and later released by the judge on 4-28-18



Notable Arrests / Incidents of Note (Cont.)

On 4-29-18, Taraval TNT Officers conducted a probation search at the 100 block of Brighton St and on the suspect. The suspect is on probation for a shooting that occurred in 2015 at 100 block of Brighton St and has a search condition with a no possession of firearms condition. At 1159 hours, TNT were allowed entry into his houe by the sole occupant, the suspect. A search was conducted and found 3 firearms, multiple rounds of live amo, high capacity magazines and 2 black ski masks. DNA was collected from the suspect and a request for DNA Swabs of collected evidence was requested. The suspect was transported and booked on the above charges.

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

- 1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
- 2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
- 3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.

We have provided major support to the San Francisco Police Department and Mayor's Office by acting as a fiscal agent for these federal and state funded grants, along with participating in numerous crime prevention activities as a part of these grants.


