SFPD Holiday Toy Drive – November 16 to December 14

SFPD Holiday Toy Drive

The San Francisco Police Department launched its 2018 Holiday Toy Drive, benefiting the City's children in need.

From November 16 to December 14, SFPD will be accepting donations of new, unwrapped toys at more than 60 San Francisco Walgreens locations. The goal is to exceed last year's toy drive, in which approximately 9,000 items were donated at Walgreens stores for distribution to San Francisco children.

"Something as simple as a toy can stir a child's imagination and bring joy to youth in need," said San Francisco Police Chief William Scott. "Please give generously to make this holiday season brighter for our City's children."

Donors can purchase or drop off a new, unwrapped toy at any San Francisco Walgreens that features a brightly colored and marked toy drive collection bin. Those unable to drop off a toy may also contribute to a Go Fund Me account

Safe Shopper - Holiday Season Safety Tips


During this holiday season, the Police Department will be working to enhance safety for residents, visitors, and shoppers. There will be increased foot patrols to shopping areas throughout the city, including the horse/mounted unit, plain clothes officers, and traffic enforcement.

"The men and women of the San Francisco Police Department wish everyone a safe and joyful holiday season. Whether you're shopping for gifts or going about your daily routine, it's important to remain careful and aware to prevent theft. Follow our tips to help keep you and your belongings safe."

- Stay alert when using electronic devices. Limit your distractions.
- Always be alert to your surroundings and have your keys in your hand as you approach your vehicle.
- Park Smart: Help avoid vehicle break-ins, leave nothing visible in your car. Consider moving your vehicle to a different location each time you load packages in the trunk. Try to use parking lots where there are parking attendants.
- Keep your wallet in a hard-to-reach place and carry only the cash and credit cards that you will need to complete your shopping.
- If someone demands your purse, wallet, or packages, surrender them, make note of the suspect's description and direction they flee and call 911. Property can be replaced.
- "If you see something, say something." If you witness criminal activity or see something or someone suspicious, flag down a police officer, call 911 or contact security.
- Use 311 to report auto burglaries.
- Shop with a companion, especially after dark, whenever possible.
- Shield your PIN when using ATMs or other electronic devices in public.

Unlawfully Causing a Fire – Cited

<u>8:05 pm</u>

Officers responded to a report of a fire, which was successfully extinguished by SFFD. The suspect stated that he had wanted to get rid of some of his property but could not find a trash can and set them on fire instead. The suspect was cited.

Assault with a Gun

<u>2:43 am</u>

200 Plymouth Ave

Officers responded to a report of an assault. Responding officers located the victim, who was suffering from a gunshot wound. The victim reported that he had invited the suspect, someone he had met online, to his house earlier and the suspect had left soon after arriving. However, the suspect returned shortly after leaving and said that she had accidentally left something at his house. When the victim opened his door, the suspect was with another person who was holding a gun. The victim attempted to run away from the suspects but was shot in the process. The suspects then fled the area.

<u>Assault – Threats</u> <u>5:06 pm</u> 2500 43rd Ave

Officers responded to a report of an assault. The victim reported that she had gone over to an ex boyfriend's house to pick up some furniture and utensils. A verbal argument ensued between the victim and the suspect, the current girlfriend of the victim's ex boy-friend, and the suspect attempted to hit the victim with a hammer. The victim's ex boyfriend retrieved the hammer from the suspect and the victim left the house without further incident.

TNT officers were on patrol when they observed a suspicious vehicle with an expired registration and conduced a traffic stop. As they approached the vehicle, the officers were informed that the license plate on the vehicle had been reported as stolen. The officers detained the occupants of the vehicle and a computer check on the driver revealed that he was on probation with an arrest warrant. A search of the vehicle located a hand gun, multiple burglary tools and numerous keys. The driver and passenger were arrested.

Robbery with a Gun

San Jose Ave & Lakeview Ave

Officers responded to a report of a robbery. The victim reported that he had been texting on his cell phone with his headphone in his ears when the suspect suddenly walked up to him and pointed a gun at him. In response, the victim fearfully handed his phone to the suspect.

Robbery of a Residence

Officers responded to a report of a residential robbery. The victim reported that he had been watching TV at home when he heard a suspicious noise from upstairs. The victim then observed the suspect enter his portion of the residence. The victim stated that the suspect held an ax to the victim's neck before searching the house and stealing the victim's property. The suspect then left without further incident.

Traffic Violation – No License Issued – Cited

Officers observed a vehicle driving through a red light without stopping. The officers conducted a traffic stop and a computer check on the driver revealed that he was never issued a driver's license. The driver was cited.

Battery

Officers responded to a report of a battery. Responding officers determined that two neighbors had been at odds with each other for over 18 months which then resulted in both of them attacking each other earlier in the evening. After further investigation, both parties were cited for battery.

Brandishing a Weapon

Officers responded to a report of a gun being brandished. The victim reported that she had been walking when she observed the suspect urinating on a bush. When the suspect finished, he got into his vehicle and confronted the victim. The victim and suspect exchanged words before the suspect produced a gun and threatened the victim. The suspect then drove away.

Officers responded to a report of a robbery. The victim, a store employee, reported that the the suspect was observed stealing merchandise. The victim confronted the suspect and the suspect responded by threatening the victim with a pair of scissors before fleeing.

Officers responded to a trespassing report. The victim reported that the suspect had been observed trespassing on the victim's balcony on three separate occasions. The victim stated that he confronted the suspect each time and the suspect left without incident. Earlier in morning, the suspect was again trespassing on the victim's balcony and the victim contacted the police. Responding officers located the suspect and after further investigation, the suspect was cited.

<u> Assault – Possession of Marijuana for Sale – Arrested</u>

Officers responded to a report of a stabbing. The victim reported that he was at the suspect's house to purchase marijuana and found that the suspect's room was a mess. The victim started to clean and placed empty plastic bags along with other items into his bag before going to use the bathroom. When the victim returned, the suspect accused the victim of stealing his items. An argument ensued and the suspect stabbed the victim. Responding officers located the suspect and a search revealed numerous illegal narcotics. After further investigation, the suspect was arrested.

Robbery

Officers responded to a report of a robbery. The victim reported that he was outside his home when he heard someone running towards him. Three suspects then approached him and took the victim's property out of his pockets and also stole the victim's backpack. The suspects then ran into a vehicle before fleeing the area.

<u> Theft of Registration Tab – Traffic Violation</u>

Officers were on patrol and observed a suspicious vehicle. The officers conducted a computer check which revealed that the vehicle had an expired registration despite the vehicle displaying a current registration tab. The officers made contact with the driver and he told them that a friend had given him the registration tab. After further investigation, it was determined that the tab had been stolen off another vehicle's license plate. The driver was cited.

Battery – Vandalism to Vehicle

Officers responded to a report of a battery. Responding officers determined that an argument had ensued between a store employee and a customer before both parties hit each other. Officers responded to a report of a robbery. The victim reported that he was taking photos of the scenery when several suspects suddenly approached him from behind. The suspects held on to the victim to prevent him from leaving while pulling the victim's camera away from his hands. The suspects then fled the area in a vehicle with the stolen property.





Beware of Scams

Fake Check Scams

Consumers paid with phony checks for work or for items they're trying to sell, instructed to wire money back to buyer

Prizes/Sweepstakes/Free Gifts

Requests for payment to claim fictitious prizes, lottery winnings, or gifts

Recovery/Refund Companies

Scammers contact victims and claim the consumer owes money on a fictitious debt or to help recover money lost in a previous scam

Advance Fee Loans, Credit Arrangers

False promises of business or personal loans, even if credit is bad, for a fee upfront

Phishing/Spoofing

Emails pretending to be from a well-known source ask consumers to enter or confirm personal information

Computers: Equipment and Software

Scammers claim to offer "technical support" for computer problems and charge a fee to fix a nonexistent problem

Scholarships/Grants

For a fee, a "search company" offers to conduct customized search for scholarships or grants for students. Scammers take money and run or provide a worthless list

Friendship & Sweetheart Swindles

Con artist nurtures an online relationship, builds trust, and convinces victim to send money

Charitable Solicitations

Scammers contact victims claiming to represent non-existent charities (or real charities they don't actually work for) and ask for donations.





Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.







Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

TARAVAL STATION

Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users:

Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.

Foot Patrols:

Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.

Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings:

Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving. These meeting will be on the third Tuesday of each month.

Email Updates:

Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.


