

Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations on March 4th, 12th, 15th, 20th and 28th with a focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety. Over the past three years, the department has identified areas where significant numbers of pedestrian and bicycle-related collisions have occurred and responded by deploying additional officers to those areas in an effort to prevent deaths and injuries. Special attention will be given to Focus on the Five violations: speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for stop signs and red lights, failing to yield to pedestrians in cross walks, as well as any other dangerous violation.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use these nonmotorized means of transportation. In 2016, California witnessed 867 pedestrians and 147 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 28 percent of all traffic fatalities.

All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked or unmarked crosswalks at corners. All motorists are reminded to be mindful of others who share the road.

Wet Weather Driving Tips

Replace windshield wiper inserts that leave streaks or don't clear the glass in a single swipe. Make sure all headlights, taillights, brake lights and turn signals are properly functioning so other drivers will see you during downpours. Turn on your headlights whenever you drive. Day or night, keep your headlights on while driving in rain. California require that headlights must be in use when you cannot see more than 500 feet ahead of you. Headlights are also required when windshield wipers are turned on.

Proper tire tread depth and inflation are imperative to maintaining good traction on wet roadways. Check tread depth with a quarter inserted upside down into the tire groove. If you can see above Washington's head, start shopping for new tires. Check each tire's pressure, including the spare, at least once a month... and be sure to check the pressure when the tires are cold.

Slowing down during wet weather driving can be critical to reducing a car's chance of hydroplaning, when the tires rise up on a film of water. With as little as 1/12 inch of water on the road, tires have to displace a gallon of water per second to keep the rubber meeting the road. Drivers should reduce their speed to correspond to the amount of water on the roadway. At speeds as low as 35 mph, new tires can still lose some contact with the roadway.

To reduce chances of hydroplaning, drivers should slow down, avoid hard braking or turning sharply and drive in the tracks of the vehicle ahead of you. Also, it's important for motorists to allow ample stopping distance between cars by increasing the following distance of the vehicle in front of them and beginning to slow down to stop for intersections, turns and other traffic early.

No locking method is 100% foolproof, but this method is highly effective

GUIDE FOR LOCKING YOUR BIKE:

 Use the smallest U-lock that works for your bike to minimize the amount of space available for a thief to

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
- Use a hardened steel U-Lock to secure back wheel inside the rear triangle of the bicycle frame. Check to make sure U-lock is secured to an immovable
- metal object. Secure front wheel with cable or second U-lock. Loop cable around the down tube of the bicycle or
- secure second U-lock to front wheel and down tube. Replace quick release skewers and nutted wheels with keyed locking skewers and nuts to ensure wheels and saddles are locked to the bike frame at
- all times. Check with local bike shop for proper installation of locking skewers and advice









Precautionary Measures

 Photograph all tools.
 Ensure photographs clearly show the associated serial number and/or distinctive markings.
 Ensure job site keys are marked "Do Not Duplicate" and are controlled at all times.
 Attempt to park employee vehicles within visual range of the job site.

Immediately contact 911. Be prepared to provide the following information: a) Time of incident. b) Video (if available). c) Items taken (include make, model, description, location taken from, value, photos and serial numbers). d) Insurance information. e) Owner's information.

Officers responded to a report of an unconscious person breathing at an irregular rate. Responding officers located the person with numerous needles scattered around the area nearby. The officers determined that the person was experiencing an opiate overdose and administered emergency care with Naloxone before the arrival of a medic, who then took over.

Early January, a security camera caught two suspects burglarizing a home in the Sunset district. After further investigation, the suspects were identified and a search warrant was issued and executed. The two suspects were arrested.

400 Irving St

Officers responded to a report of a person with a knife. The victim stated that he was working on his vehicle when the suspect, a neighbor that the victim did not get along with, approached him and started to yell at him. The victim entered his vehicle in an attempt to ignore the suspect. When the suspect walked away, the victim exited the vehicle and entered into his house. Shortly after, the victim heard a commotion outside and observed that the suspect was holding on to a machete while standing next to the vehicle. The victim also noticed that his vehicle had been damaged since he last saw it. The victim confronted the suspect and a physical fight ensued. Responding officers located the suspect and after further investigation, the suspect was arrested

Officers responded to a report of a battery. The victim reported that the suspect had put her hands on him and a witness stated that the suspect had approached them with a golf club in her hands and yelled at them. Responding officers made contact with the suspect, who stated that she worked in the area and received information that several kids where in the area and making too much noise. The suspect admitted to approaching the victim and witness with a golf club in her hand and that she placed her hand on one of them, who were yelling at her. After further investigation, it was determined that there were no injuries. Neither party wanted to press charges and the suspect was admonished.

Officers responded to a report of an assault. The victim reported that he was shopping inside a store when he observed the suspect harassing the workers and patrons. The victim told the suspect to leave the store. However, once outside the store, the suspect continued to harass people who were nearby. The victim then got into an argument with the suspect which led to a physical fight. During the fight, the suspect pulled out a knife before the victim punched the suspect and the suspect fled the area. Responding officers located the suspect and a search revealed a knife in his possession. After further investigation, the suspect was arrested.



Beware of Scams

Fake Check Scams

Consumers paid with phony checks for work or for items they're trying to sell, instructed to wire money back to buyer

Prizes/Sweepstakes/Free Gifts

Requests for payment to claim fictitious prizes, lottery winnings, or gifts

Recovery/Refund Companies

Scammers contact victims and claim the consumer owes money on a fictitious debt or to help recover money lost in a previous scam

Advance Fee Loans, Credit Arrangers

False promises of business or personal loans, even if credit is bad, for a fee upfront

Phishing/Spoofing

Emails pretending to be from a well-known source ask consumers to enter or confirm personal information

Computers: Equipment and Software

Scammers claim to offer "technical support" for computer problems and charge a fee to fix a nonexistent problem

Scholarships/Grants

For a fee, a "search company" offers to conduct customized search for scholarships or grants for students. Scammers take money and run or provide a worthless list

Friendship & Sweetheart Swindles

Con artist nurtures an online relationship, builds trust, and convinces victim to send money

Charitable Solicitations

Scammers contact victims claiming to represent non-existent charities (or real charities they don't actually work for) and ask for donations.





Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.







Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

TARAVAL STATION

Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users:

Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.

Foot Patrols:

Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.

Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings:

Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving. These meeting will be on the third Tuesday of each month.

Email Updates:

Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.


