License Plate Theft Prevention Tips

Have you been a victim of License Plate Theft?

Here are Crime Prevention Tips to help safeguard your license plate:

- · Park your car in the garage if possible
- Park in your driveway, rather than the street
- Park in a well lit area, or by security motion lights
- · Install car alarm
- Install surveillance cameras
- Install theft prevention screws



Many property crime suspects are often in possession of a Phillips head or flat head screwdriver. They are rarely in possession of a screwdriver with a unique head like a Torx bit. Simply replacing your standard license plate screws with a unique bit will likely deter a license plate theft. The suspect will quickly realize he/she does not have the right tool and will move onto the next vehicle.









License plates covers (even clear) that cover the whole license plate are not authorized by the California Vehicle Code per section 5201(c)

Prevent Registration Stickers Theft: After you place your registration sticker on your plate, use a razor to cut lines into it, (be careful). This will make it impossible for a suspect to remove it in one piece.

CVC/5201. (a) License plates shall at all times be securely fastened to the vehicle for which they are issued so as to prevent the plates from swinging, shall be mounted in a position so as to be clearly visible, and so that the characters are upright and display from left to right, and shall be maintained in a condition so as to be clearly legible. The rear license plate shall be mounted not less than 12 inches nor more than 60 inches from the ground, and the front license plate shall be mounted not more than 60 inches from the ground, keep in mind that no identifying mark on the license plate can be covered.

Safe Shopper - Holiday Season Safety Tips

During this holiday season, the Police Department will be working to enhance safety for residents, visitors, and shoppers. There will be increased foot patrols to shopping areas throughout the city, including the horse/mounted unit, plain clothes officers, and traffic enforcement.

- Stay alert when using electronic devices. Limit your distractions.
- Always be alert to your surroundings and have your keys in your hand as you approach your vehicle.
- Park Smart: Help avoid vehicle break-ins, leave nothing visible in your car. Consider moving your vehicle to a different location each time you load packages in the trunk. Try to use parking lots where there are parking attendants.
- Keep your wallet in a hard-to-reach place and carry only the cash and credit cards that you will need to complete your shopping.
- If someone demands your purse, wallet, or packages, surrender them, make note of the suspect's description and direction they flee and call 911. Property can be replaced.
- "If you see something, say something." If you witness criminal activity or see something or someone suspicious, flag down a police officer, call 911 or contact security.
- Use 311 to report auto burglaries.
- Shop with a companion, especially after dark, whenever possible.
- Shield your PIN when using ATMs or other electronic devices in public.

Holiday Travel Plans? Tips to Keep Your Home Safe

This month, the holiday season is officially upon us and that means San Francisco residents will join millions of others across the country in traveling to spend time with family and friends.

But before heading out, SF SAFE hopes you'll check out our tips for helping to protect your home against burglary so that your holiday season may truly be merry. Here are some key steps you can take this holiday season to help keep your home secure while you're out and about:

- **Don't advertise**: Avoid advertising you're leaving on vacation and that your house will be empty. Load your luggage in your garage or at a time when people aren't around.
- **Social media**: Along the same lines of "don't advertise," is don't post on social media about your trip in advance or while it's underway; leave it until after you've returned home.
- Lock up: Before you leave on your trip, make sure to lock all of your doors and windows—this includes pet doors and sliding glass doors.
- Secure your property: Be sure to turn on your home security system before you go. Place your valuables in a safe or safety deposit box and secure items like patio furniture, tools, etc.
- Inventory: Mark your valuables with your CA driver's license number in case identification and recovery is needed. Keep an inventory of them that includes serial numbers and photos.
- Lights: Put your house lights, TV and radios on intermittent timers to signify inside activity. Installing motion-sensing lights outdoors also helps deter would-be home burglars.
- **Neighbors**: If your neighbors are staying home, ask them to keep an eye on your house and to park a car in your driveway. Be sure to give them your emergency contact numbers.
- Mail: Have your mail/newspaper delivery stopped and arrange for neighbors to pick up any fliers and packages that might be delivered.
- Drapes & shades: Be sure your drapes and/or shades are all closed to deter prying eyes.
- Extra Key: Don't leave a spare key hidden outside your home—thieves know all the hiding places.

Protect Your Vehicle Against Catalytic Converter Theft & Prius Hybrid Battery Theft





Thieves are looking for fuel-powered vehicles manufactured after 1974 that have catalytic converters. Thieves often target taller vehicles (such as pickup trucks or SUVs and now Prius) because they can easily fit under the vehicle to access the catalytic converter. The location of your car may also be a factor like regularly parking in one area for a long period of time. When possible, park in well-lit areas and close to building entrances. If you have a garage at your house, park your vehicle inside and keep the garage door close.

Have the catalytic converter welded to your car's frame, which may make it harder to steal.

Consider engraving your vehicle identification number (VIN) on the catalytic converter — this may help alert a scrap dealer that it was stolen and make it easier to identify the owner.

Calibrate your car's alarm to set off when it detects vibration.

Protect Your Vehicle from Car Theft

- Never leave your car running or the keys in the ignition when you're away from it, even for "just a minute."
- Always roll up the windows and lock the car, even if it's in front of your home.
- Never leave valuables in plain view, even if your car is locked. Put them in the trunk or at least out of sight.
- Remove portable electronic devices such as smart phones and GPS navigation systems, including suction cup or bean bag type mounts. (Even the visible appearance of a suction cup ring on the glass windshield can be an enticement to a thief to break in and look for the GPS system.)
- Park in busy, well-lighted area.
- Carry the registration and insurance card with you. Don't leave personal identification documents or credit cards in your vehicle.
- When you pay to park in a lot or garage, leave just the ignition or valet key with the attendant. Make sure no personal information is attached. Do the same when you take your car for repairs.
- Install a mechanical locking device commonly called clubs, collars, or j-bars that lock to the steering wheel, column, or brake to prevent the wheel from being turned more than a few degrees. Use it!

• Investigate in security systems. You may get a discount on your auto insurance.



Taraval Community Members, We are seeing an increase in burglaries targeting homes that are under construction. In these incidents, suspects would break into the building or construction sites and steal numerous high end construction equipment. Currently, if your home is under construction and no one is at that location after work hours, please call Taraval Station at 415-759-3100 and provide your name and the address of the construction site and phone number. We can have our officers conduct passing calls.

Burglary Awareness & Prevention Tips for Construction Sites



Securing & Preventing

- 1. Secure all equipment and vehicles at all times.
- Take effort to reduce the visibility of tools and equipment secured in vehicles or on job sites.
- Make use of adequate lighting in conjunction with open chain-link fencing on the perimeter to allow for high visibility to the job site.
- Strongly consider the use of security systems such as alarms and video surveillance. Ensure signage for such is clearly visible.

Precautionary Measures

- Photograph all tools.
 Ensure photographs clearly show the associated serial number and/or distinctive markings.
- Ensure job site keys are marked "Do Not Duplicate" and are controlled at all times.
- 3. Attempt to park employee vehicles within visual range of the job site.

Should a Burglary Occur

Immediately contact 911. Be prepared to provide the following information:

- a) Time of incident.
- b) Video (if available).
- c) Items taken (include make, model, description, location taken from, value, photos and serial numbers).
- d) Insurance information.
- e) Owner's information.





How to Describe a Suspect

Providing a detailed description of a criminal suspect can help solve crimes in San Francisco. Suspects can easily change their appearance with a hat, jacket or glasses. It is important to be mindful of unique characteristics such as body markings, tattoos, shoes and specific clothing markings, like logos.

What to Do During an Emergency



How to Call 911 in an Emergency

- ☑ Remain Calm and Dial 911 Immediately
 - · WHEN to Dial 911
 - · If a crime is posing an immediate threat to you or others
 - · If there is a medical emergency
 - · If the incident is in progress
 - · If the incident just occurred and you know where the suspect is
- ☑ State the following information:
 - WHERE the incident is happening and WHAT is occurring, for example: "I'm at 1234 Market Street and I've just been robbed"
 - · Tell the operator if you are in immediate danger or are being threatened
 - Be brief, clear and accurate
- $\ensuremath{\square}$ As long as it is safe, stay on the line and answer the operator's questions
- ☑ Describe each suspect separately from head to toe (see more information on the back of this card)

Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team

(ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer civilian disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in various tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities throughout the year.

Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco. ALERT volunteers complete a basic DOJ/FBI background check and complete two 8-hour classes at the Police Academy to graduate. Active members must participate in one 4-hour drill in each calendar year to remain active, but may also donate more time during various Station support and outreach activities throughout the year.

ALERT Training

ALERT training requires two 8-hour classes to graduate

Day #1

- Introduction to ALERT
- The Law
- Deployment Protocols
- Traffic Control
- Radio Communications

Day #2

- Conflict Resolution
- Medical Assistance
- Missing Person Search
- Patrolling & Site Protection
- Graduation

Classes take place on successive Saturdays at the SFPD Police Academy in Diamond Heights.





Beware of Scams

Fake Check Scams

Consumers paid with phony checks for work or for items they're trying to sell, instructed to wire money back to buyer

Prizes/Sweepstakes/Free Gifts

Requests for payment to claim fictitious prizes, lottery winnings, or gifts

Recovery/Refund Companies

Scammers contact victims and claim the consumer owes money on a fictitious debt or to help recover money lost in a previous scam

Advance Fee Loans, Credit Arrangers

False promises of business or personal loans, even if credit is bad, for a fee upfront

Phishing/Spoofing

Emails pretending to be from a well-known source ask consumers to enter or confirm personal information

Computers: Equipment and Software

Scammers claim to offer "technical support" for computer problems and charge a fee to fix a nonexistent problem

Scholarships/Grants

For a fee, a "search company" offers to conduct customized search for scholarships or grants for students. Scammers take money and run or provide a worthless list

Friendship & Sweetheart Swindles

Con artist nurtures an online relationship, builds trust, and convinces victim to send money

Charitable Solicitations

Scammers contact victims claiming to represent non-existent charities (or real charities they don't actually work for) and ask for donations.

Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.



Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users:

Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.

Foot Patrols:

Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.

Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings:

Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving. These meeting will be on the third Tuesday of each month.

Email Updates:

Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.


